
Prairie Corridor on Haines Branch

The Prairie Corridor on Haines Branch is a tallgrass prairie passage and trail that will build on our nationally recognized trail and greenway system and will link two of Lincoln and Lancaster County's premier environmental resource and education centers. It will follow the Haines Branch of Salt Creek from the Pioneers Park Nature Center, to the Conestoga Lake State Recreation Area, extend down through the Village of Denton and on to the Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center. When completed, it will provide a 20-mile round-trip ride.

The Corridor will enhance economic development, support environmental education and promote the enhancement and preservation of one of Nebraska's most valuable resources — tallgrass prairie. One of the most vulnerable ecosystems in the United States, less than 1 percent of tallgrass prairie remains. The vision is of a tallgrass prairie corridor along the Haines Branch of Salt Creek, with a crushed limestone trail that allows users to traverse and explore the prairie and connect to Lincoln's 134-mile trails network.

Approximately two-thirds of the priority area for the Prairie Corridor is conserved to date. This includes Pioneers Park, Conestoga Lake State Recreation Area and Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center — destination areas that are being connected as part of the project.


Wilderness Park




JAYNE SNYDER TRAILS CENTER



Located in Union Park Plaza, the Jayne Snyder Trails Center serves as the center for Lincoln's extensive trails system. This facility offers space for socializing, and a local foods café called The Hub Café. Current hours and menu for The Hub Café can be found online or call 402-474-BIKE (2435). A BikeLNK is available across the street from the Center.

On-road route (gravel road) to Lied Pedestrian Bridge over the Platte River. Lied Trail Bridge currently closed due to 2019 flood damage.


Jamaica North / Homestead Trail



The Chief Standing Bear Trail continues another 23 miles from Beatrice, NE to the Nebraska/Kansas state line. At the state line, the Blue River Rail Trail continues another 12 miles to Marysville, KS.

Oak Creek Trail

Whether covered by a canopy of oak woodlands or traveling along a ridgeline with beautiful views, you'll find the 13 miles of the Oak Creek Trail, located 23 miles northwest of Lincoln between Valparaiso and Brainard, invigorating and fun.



Resources



The City of Lincoln implemented a bike share program called BikeLNK in the spring of 2018. BikeLNK is automated self-service bicycle rental program for short trips. In addition to over 100 bikes in the fleet, there are also 5 electric pedal-assist bikes.

To use BikeLNK, visit one of the 21 stations on this map and use the kiosk instructions or your smartphone to access a bike. You will either need to be a member of the bike share program or there is an option to purchase a short-term membership to use the bike.
