Tour de Lincoln

Join the Great Plains Trails Network (GPTN) this May as they celebrate National Bike Month with the annual Tour de Lincoln bicycle rides.

Now in its 21st year, GPTN's popular Thursday evening rides invite cyclists to explore different areas of Lincoln. Each ride begins and ends at the Jayne Snyder Trails Center, located at 228 North 21st Street in Union Plaza Park. Rides roll out at 6:00 p.m. Tour de Lincoln (TDL) maps are available at local bike shops, running stores, coffee shops, and at Lincoln Parks and Recreation's main office. Spanish-language maps are also available.

Members of GPTN's Board of Directors lead each ride, provide basic mechanical support, and ensure no one is left behind. Routes range from 12 to 18 miles and are designed to introduce riders to a variety of trails, terrain, and features throughout the city. Refreshments will be available before each ride, with popsicles and fudgesicles waiting at the finish!

Cyclists of all ages and families are encouraged to participate. Many past riders have shared how much they enjoyed discovering new trails beyond their own neighborhoods. With more than 183 miles of connected pathways, Lincoln's trails system offers something for everyone – and Tour de Lincoln is a great way to experience it.

2026 GPTN ANNUAL MEETING

The 37th Annual Meeting of the Great Plains Trails Network was held Saturday, February 7, 2026 at the Cornhusker Bank Community Center in Lincoln. A great turnout of people came to hear some exciting speakers giving updates of our trails.

Nicole Fleck-Tooze and Travis Jensen from Solidago Conservancy started out the program by providing a collaborative update about the Prairie Corridor on Haines Branch, the 7.5-mile-long corridor linking Pioneers Park and Spring Creek Prairie with a recreational trail near Denton. The Corridor will support economic development, build on Lincoln's nationally recognized trails system, support environmental education, and promote the enhancement and preservation of one of Nebraska's most valuable resources – tallgrass prairies.

Fleck-Tooze is the founding Executive Director of Solidago Conservancy, where she has led initiatives with partners to conserve nearly 600 acres of parks, natural resource lands, and trail connections. Travis Jensen is the Community Conservation

Coordinator for Solidago Conservancy. Travis, Nicole and two of their partners, JJ Yost from Lincoln Parks and Recreation, and Ed Hubbs from Spring Creek Prairie Audubon Center, were recognized for their partnership and support on this project.

Alex Duryea recently joined Lincoln Parks and Recreation as their Planning and Construction Trails Manager. He provided a comprehensive update, slides and videos on many exciting trail projects. Here are some highlights of his presentation.

Chris Beutler Trail:

Located within the South Haymarket Park, construction is underway on the new Chris Beutler Trail which will connect the N Street Cycle Track and the Pinnacle Bank Arena Trail to the southern end of the park at about 6th and L Streets. The trail will be connected to the Jamaica North Trail at 4th and J Streets with a future project as development in the area continues. Completion for this project is scheduled for September 2026.

Dietrich Trail Lighting:

A trail lighting refresh is being done between 21st and 26th Streets on the Dietrich Trail.

This project should be finished by early spring, 2026 and brings great enhancement to the lighting quality, improving safety, all while greatly reducing lighting impacts to neighbors along the trail.

Rock Island Old Cheney Street Underpass:

This project will provide a grade separated crossing of the Rock Island Trail at Old Cheney Road by constructing an undercrossing of the roadway. The crossing will be located in the approximate alignment of the existing trail and connections to the sidewalks on each side of Old Cheney will be made. The project is in design and anticipated to see construction in late 2027/2028.

Following the presentations, Meredith Cain, Mary Jo Gillespie, Taylor Gold, and Allison Speicher were installed as new GPTN board members (see new member article on page 8) and the Annual awards program took place.

Trail Boss Award

Corey Godfrey, Retiring Board Member

The Trail Boss Award is given to an individual or organization who takes leadership in implementing trail and bike-pedestrian related projects or plans to better the community through better trail access and use.

Corey Godfrey was recognized for his outstanding leadership skills having served on the board for over 15 years and has filled other leadership roles including Treasurer, Vice President, and Secretary. He helped lead the MoPac Alliance, a joint coalition between GPTN, Bike Walk Nebraska, and the Nebraska Trails Foundation. The mission of the coalition is to connect the 9.5-mile gap on the MoPac Trail between Lincoln and Omaha. The past year, the groundwork - and even signage - has been laid in a large part to Corey's tireless efforts.

Using a custom bike trailer equipped with saws and cutters, this team ensures paths are cleared shortly after storms and maintained every few years. Their proactive efforts greatly assist the city, earning each of them a well-deserved Project Award.

Riley Bike Bus

Bike buses are grassroots organized bicycle rides led by a parent or adult to ride with a group of children along a predetermined path to get to school. The Riley Bike Bus, led by GPTN Board Member, Joe Dauer, was recognized for their efforts in providing bicycle safety and trail etiquette to the student riders, and encouraging the next generation of trail users in our city.

The Board of Directors thanks everyone who attended our annual meeting as well as everyone's continued support of GPTN. We hope to see you all again at next year's meeting which will be held on Saturday, February 20, 2027.

Tech on the Trails:

“Ride with GPS” Gives Members Clear, Simple Navigation

Technology shapes how people move through Lincoln’s trails system, and Great Plains Trails Network members now gain a tool that supports every ride, run, and walk. **Ride with GPS** brings clear maps, turn cues, and a smooth setup that helps members explore the city with confidence.

GPTN launched **Ride with GPS** access this year. Members join the GPTN club inside the app and see the full library of routes for Trail-A-Thon, Trail Trek, and Tour de Lincoln. Each route includes a clean map, cue sheet, and elevation profile. Members also hear turn by turn audio prompts, which guide them through each route without the need to look at a screen.



Trail A Thon encourages people to move on the trails in any way that fits their day. Trail Trek enters its 24th year and brings riders through parks, neighborhoods, and key trail connections. Tour de Lincoln highlights each quadrant of the city and offers a clear view of the trails network’s reach.

All three events now sit in one place inside the app, ready for members to use.

The setup takes only a few steps. Members open the app, join the GPTN club, choose a route, and start their activity. The audio cues guide each turn. The map shows progress. The route library stays organized and easy to browse.

Ride with GPS supports people who want structure and people who want freedom. Some riders follow a full event route. Others pick a short loop for a quick outing. Walkers and runners use the same features and follow the same cues. The tool fits each pace and each style of movement.

GPTN added **Ride with GPS**

to strengthen access to the trails system and to help members explore with clarity. Lincoln’s trails offer space for fitness, connection, and discovery. This tool gives members a simple way to reach those experiences.

IMPROVING LINCOLN TOGETHER

UPLNK is a free app hosted on the SeeClickFix platform. Use it to report non-emergency quality-of-life issues within the Lincoln City limits, such as streetlight problems, downed tree limbs, potholes or parks & trail maintenance issues. There is an option to upload a photo with each service request. You can also use the app to access various City databases.

Alexander Duryea gave a 2025 Trails Report during the Annual Meeting, during which he mentioned various trail maintenance projects that he had participated in as of late, some of which were issues reported to the City of Lincoln via the online app portal, called **UPLNK**. On this portal, using a phone or on the website, trail users can report issues out in real time by marking your location on a map and then allowing you to pick from the menu of options for what issue you might be experiencing in the community. Many categories exist since this is a City of Lincoln based application, meant to help residents report issues they might be having with a variety of needs in the community, not just trails alone.

Alex mentioned that if trail users experience anything on the trail they feel might need some attention, like

drainage, uneven surfaces, misuse, signage concerns, or even suggestions for enhancements, **UPLNK** is a great place to submit these issues. Staff can track requests, get work orders processed for correction, and pinpoint concerns at a place and time, in the moment, to provide a more accurate snapshot of how Lincoln’s trails are serving the needs of the Lincoln community.

As the City of Lincoln owns the trails and manages their daily maintenance, Great Plains Trails Network wants to help support this positive effort to continue to grow the trails system in all the best ways by recognizing that everyone’s voice and experience matters as we move through the community in which we love. That experience, viewpoint, and growth in those blindspots makes us all better. So if you see something, say something!

Celebrate America's 250 years with a Relay Lincoln is a Designated Stop

In 2026, the American Discovery Trail Society (ADTS) celebrates the outdoors and 250 years of our

independence with the American Discovery 250 Relay. This 6,800-mile relay from California to Delaware will cross the Golden Gate Bridge on the 4th of July and ending on Thanksgiving at the Atlantic Ocean. The ADTS invites all to join in the celebration by participating for a day or more in a relay, attending one of over 100 local events, or sharing your story of personal growth and adventure. Together, we commemorate America's past and shape our future.

The Relay time schedule has not been finalized yet, but at the moment the current calendar has 250 Relay in the Lincoln to Omaha region during the fourth week of September.

Eric Howard, the Executive Director of ADTS said, "As Lincoln is the state capital, my hope is that we might do something special that afternoon/evening. The plan is to be in Omaha on Wednesday night and Thursday of that week."

As events are scheduled and plans are solidified, Lincoln Parks and Recreations and GPTN will continue to update their websites with event details.



The American Discovery Trail is the nation's first non-motorized coast-to-coast trail. It runs for 6,800 miles through 15 states and Washington, D.C. The route incorporates numerous local, state, and national trails, with most of them designed for walking, hiking, and running and for bicycle and equestrian use. It connects scores of scenic and historic trails, backcountry roads, national parks and forests plus thousands of state and local properties of historic, cultural and natural significance. Users can experience their local environment, or the 23 ecosystems the trail passes through – deserts, mountains, forests, waterfronts, and plains. You can learn more about the ADT by visiting www.discoverytrail.org.

There are many ways to learn about America. ADTS welcomes your involvement as a participant, sponsor, or simply an enthusiast who follows the relay from your couch! This is not a sports or athletic contest, exhibition, festival, parade, or fundraiser.

The relay is a celebration of America and a celebration of the American Discovery

Trail — educating people about American history, culture, and nature.

ADTS looks forward to your involvement. Participants can sign up in advance to walk, run or ride specific sections of the trail. The 35-year-old route passes through lands and trails overseen by numerous state and local agencies and organizations in fifteen states, the National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, as well as near the homes of more than 40 million people. Relayers and participants will be from around the country and also abroad, with opportunities for businesses, families, students, older residents, and communities of all types to be involved.

The ADTS is making the turn-by-turn route instructions and GPS tracks free to the public during the 2026 year as part of the celebrations thanks to a generous donation from Indiana Trails. To access these files, visit: discoverytrail.org/route

Volunteer with the Relay: There are lots of ways that you can support the relay as it passes through your community. We'll need logistical assistance, drivers to shuttle relay participants, hosts to offer a drink or a meal, and others to just spread the word locally. 

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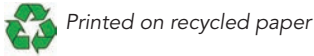


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
